The meeting was chaired by Joshua Miller at the City's Central Maintenance Facility Conference Room and called to order at 7:00 p.m.

Minutes: The minutes of the October 24, 2018 meeting were approved with the spelling

correction of the name Chris Buske under item C.

Business Agenda.

A. Recommendation to approve the McDonough Park Active Aging design proposal. Todd Chwala discussed McDonough Park and proposed plans to incorporate active aging amenities into McDonough Park.

Phil Johnson, from CBS² Consulting was present at the meeting and reviewed the concept plan for the amenities. Phil discussed the various activity areas which would include relocating the basketball court closer to the pickleball courts, the addition of fitness equipment to the north of the existing pavilion, a yard game area to the east of the pavilion, trails and overlooks, a restroom to the east of the pickleball courts, and some natural areas.

Marilyn Skrivseth discussed the concept of the active aging amenities noting the need to provide park facilities that integrate activities and facilities for all ages. These amenities will also provide opportunities for people to socialize and interact with one another.

Mike Peterson also spoke about the active aging amenities and the importance of the additional restroom facility proposed to the east of the pickleball courts.

The Commission discussed the concept plan noting the following:

- Susan McLeod questioned whether the trail use between bicyclists and pedestrians could be separated in some way?
- Ron Doering noted that there is a need for some overflow parking when tournaments are scheduled at the pickleball courts.
- Ron also questioned the proposed location of the basketball court noting that it may create a parking issue. He suggested moving the court further west than proposed in order to encourage those using the basketball courts to park in the far west parking lot.
- Tom Fielder questioned whether the concept plan was trying to include too many facilities within the park.

Todd Chwala noted that they could look at options to provide some separation between pedestrians and bicyclists. He also noted that an area to the east of the parking lot located to the east of the pickleball courts could be left open to accommodate overflow parking.

ACTION TAKEN: Ron Doering moved to recommend approval of the concept plan noting that the proposed basketball court location should be moved to the west, overflow parking should be accommodated, and staff should consider options to provide separation between pedestrians and bicyclists along the trail extending along Dells Pond. Terry Weld seconded the motion. All votes were in favor. Motion carried.

B. Recommendation on a request to vacate the Gibson Street right-of-way located to the west of Graham Avenue. Pat Ivory provided an overview of a petition to vacate the Gibson Street right-of-way located to the west of Graham Avenue. The request was submitted by the abutting property owners. Pat noted that a parcel would be reserved along the Chippewa River to be deeded to the City to allow for the extension of the trail along the river. Also, a public access easement would be required to allow for the public to access the river from Graham Avenue. It was also noted that view-shed easement to restrict blocking the view of the river from Graham Avenue was being considered.

The Commission questioned the reason for the request noting that the applicant was not present. They also questioned the details of the public assess easement regarding whether it would be for the full width of the right-of-way or for a portion of the right-of-way, could vehicles park within this easement thus obstructing access, and would it be improved as an actual pathway and signed at both the west and east ends as available for public use.

Staff noted that if the right-of-way was vacated, the City would not be responsible for any maintenance and that the City's parking regulations would not apply.

Several Commission members questioned the need to consider the request until more details would be provided by the applicant. Others noted that the installation of the loading dock to the south of the Pablo Center was already blocking a portion of the right-of-way, thus making it difficult to use as a public street.

ACTION TAKEN: Tom Fiedler moved to recommend approval of the street vacation with the easements as discussed and the City taking ownership of the parcel along the riverfront. Ron Doering seconded the motion. The motion carried with Kirk Dahl, Joh Bodkin, and Joshua Miller voting no.

Other Items.

-The Commission reviewed the special events listing and Director's Report.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:55 p.m.

Description: Recommendation to approve construction of the trail and amenities for the County Veteran's Tribute proposal.

Location: Forest Street

Background: The City of Eau Claire entered into an agreement with the Eau Claire County Veteran's Fundraising Group to raise funds to construct a County Veteran's Tribute in the Forest Street Greenway located off of Forest Street just south of the City's Central Maintenance Facility.

Justification: The project will be fundraised to construct a trail that will connect the City's bike and pedestrian trails from the High Bridge to Phoenix Park, a Veteran's Gathering area that will be used for ceremonial remembrances, a parking lot, restrooms, and monuments remembering conflicts that resident's from Eau Claire County participated in. The project will be conducted in phases, which will consist of the following;

- Phase 1 (2019) Construction of Trail and Gathering Area (\$650K)
- Phase 2 (2020) Construction of Parking Lot and Lights along trail (\$250K)
- Phase 3 (2021) Construction of Restrooms (\$200K)
- Phase 4 (2022) Construction of Military Monuments (\$1.1M)

Part of this project will be constructed on property that was purchased with money from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), and approval was sought and granted for this project.



RE: Veteran's Tribute Trail

Commissioners:

The Eau Claire Police Department is a strong supporter of Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) principles. CPTED is a nationally known design process used for new construction and its surroundings (but encompasses existing locations) to discourage or impede criminal crime.

One of the four main principles of CPTED is called Natural Surveillance which focuses on how criminal activity tends to be more prevalent in areas that are dark and in locations where it is much easier to hide. There are several best practices to improve the natural surveillance at the Veteran's park; these best practices include:

- Keeping the area well lit. It is important to have a clear line of sight so an individual can see both into the park and out of the park. With this clear line of sight, the park activity can be observed from farther distances away to include officers travelling on the roadway and residents will also be able to see and report activity if necessary.
- It is our understanding that the CPTED principles were used in identifying the best location of certain structures and the location of the sidewalk to best accommodate people who will be using this park. Even with all the efforts in structure design, without proper and strategically placed lighting (or not having proper lighting at all), unlit walk ways create better opportunity for someone to be undetected within the park during hours of darkness.
- The use of public space cameras is another tool that can be utilized to assist with the natural surveillance of this park. Several of our public space cameras in and near parks have been successful examples of why public space cameras are beneficial. Public space cameras are a proactive tool to deter criminal activity and an investigative tool that allows us to get eyes on a specific location in a timely fashion. Along with proper placement of the public space cameras, it is equally important to have adequate lighting to properly utilize these tools.

Also, citizens tend to feel safer with proper lighting of sidewalks and trails. Strategic placement of lighting and cameras increase the chance that a potential offender will be seen or that the offender thinks they will be seen, which can deter crime. It is my recommendation that proper and adequate lighting is a necessary step in the creation of this park for the safety of people using and passing through the park.

Description: 2019 State Street Reconstruction - Jaycette Park, State Street /

MacArthur Urban Park

Location: State Street, Jaycette Park, and State Street / MacArthur Urban Park.

Background: State Street, from 300' south of Hamilton Avenue to Garfield Avenue is proposed to be reconstructed as part of the City's 2019 CIP Streets Program. Pavement, utility, and intersection improvements are being proposed for the project. Roundabouts are being proposed at the intersections of State Street with Lexington Boulevard, MacArthur Avenue, and Hamilton Avenue. The roundabouts proposed for Hamilton Avenue and MacArthur Avenue fit within the existing right of way. Because of the volume of traffic in the intersection, the roundabout at Lexington Boulevard requires additional right of way for construction. All of the required right of way lies within Jaycette Park. The project will only require a portion of Jaycette Park, not the entire acreage included in the park. The project also proposes replacing the stairs connecting State Street to Putnam Drive and improving the ease to transport a bicycle down the stairs to Putnam Drive is possible.

An initial goal of the project was to improve pedestrian access to Jaycette Park to help it become more of an asset to the neighborhood. Feedback from stakeholders during the public involvement process indicated little interest in integrating the park into the neighborhood and rather shifting attention to the State Street / MacArthur Urban Park as a recreational resource for the neighborhood. Feedback was consistent to improve the intersection of Lexington Boulevard and State Street and use whatever lands needed from Jaycette Park to do so while relocting Jaycette Park assets affected by construction to the State Street / MacArthur Urban Park.

Based on the feedback from the public, and the intersection improvements possible by the proposed roundabout at Lexington Boulevard, staff proposes using lands from Jaycette Park to improve the intersection and relocating affected assets from Jaycette Park to State Street / MacArthur urban park. Picnic and seating opportunities will be available for use in both urban parks upon completion of construction.

If the project is approved by the City Council as proposed, the project is scheduled to begin construction in late May 2019 and be complete by December 2019. If the City Council does not approve the proposed improvements to the Lexington Boulevard intersection then there would not be any impacts to, or change of use to Jaycette Park and State Street / MacArthur Urban Park.

Justification: Improvements to the intersection of Lexington Boulevard and relocation of Jaycette Park assets to the State Street / MacArthur Urban park will both improve vehicular capacity and safety while making park assets more accessible to residents.

Proposed Location: State Street / Lexington Boulevard Intersection, Jaycette Park, and State Street / MacArthur Urban Park.

Facilities Features: Finished project will relocate affected playground equipment and picnic tables from Jaycette Park to State Street / MacArthur Urban Park. The fire station parking lot will be adjusted as necessary to serve the fire station after construction.


Storm Water: No impacts.

City of Eau Claire Park and Open Space Master Plan: Opportunities for recreation within both urban parks are consistent with the Parks and Open Space Master Plan. Both parks will have passive recreation opportunities which is consistent with features of an urban park. The Parks and Open Space Master Plan specifically mentions paving the parking lot serving Jaycette Park and Fire Station 10. The project proposes to include parking lot improvements with construction.

City Comprehensive Plan: Consistent with goals of 2015 Comprehensive Plan regarding "Mitigate traffic congestion when and where necessary to maintain traffic flow and minimize travel delays with a balanced approach that respects community values."



Subject: Declaring 100 N. Farwell Street (Railroad Lot) Excess Land Report

City staff has received several inquiries from developers regarding the potential sale of the Cityowned property located at 100 N. Farwell Street. The parcel of land is located along the Eau Claire River, west of N Barstow Street, and east of N Farwell Street. Staff has reviewed these requests and determined the property to be more valuable as a redevelopment site than a parking lot. The portion of the property used for a recreational trail along the Eau Claire River would be retained by the City.

The attached report regarding the potential disposition of land located at 100 Farwell Street has been prepared under the Policy for Disposal of Land. The request to declare this property excess land will be reviewed by the Waterways and Parks Commission at their meeting on January 23, 2019 and Plan Commission at their meeting on February 4, 2019. Upon the City Council's approval declaring the property excess land a formal request for proposals will be issued.

The City would retain the portion of the property along the river which includes the recreational trail. The specific boundaries have not been defined at this time.

Property is believed to have been acquired before 1961.

REASON FOR DISPOSITION

This property was identified by staff as excess as part of a review of city-owned property.





Subject: Authorize the purchase of property along Folsom Street (Parcel nos. 14-0097, 14-0101 and 14-0100)

The property owner of vacant land located along Folsom Street has agreed to sell three parcels of land (Parcel numbers 14-0097, 14-0101 and 14-0100). The property is located south of Folsom Street, west of 7th Street and north of Bolles Street. The acquisition of the properties will allow for a new park.

A phase I was completed on the property in February of 2017; the assessment revealed no evidence of recognized environmental conditions in connection with the property.

An appraisal was completed for the three parcels in March of 2017. The market value opinion provided in the appraisal was a total of \$285,000 for all three parcels.

 Parcel # 3 14-0097 \$117,500

The purchase agreement for the acquisition of the three parcels is for \$285,000; the same amount as the market value option provided in the appraisal.

The Parks System section of the 2005 Comprehensive Plan, Objective 1, Policy 2 states, "Acquire land for new parks and trail in the approximate locations and sizes illustrated by Figure 5-1, Parks and Greenway Plan, and listed in Table 5-2, Existing and Planned Parks and Greenways and School Playground sites."

Also, under Policy 2 of the 2005 Comprehensive Plan it states:


Folsom Street Park: One new Neighborhood Playground is proposed between Folsom and Bolles Streets, just south of Roosevelt Elementary School, where two new bicycle paths intersect. (Numbered 69 on Figure 5-1.) This neighborhood has a shortage of park space and is nearly fully developed.

This acquisition is consistent with the objective and goals of the plan.

ACQUISITION OF PROPERTY ALONG FOLSOM STREET PARCELS 14-0097, 14-0101, 14-0100



Parks Division

The recent weather has been favorable for staff to make progress battling invasive vegetation, which is primarily buckthorn removal. Ice rink maintenance has been a challenge with the unusual weather pattern; however, the rinks have been fairly well attended. Park staff have also been involved with tree removal in parks where trees dead and in declining health have been targeted for removal.

Park and Street Staff continue to assist our Forestry staff in the battle against the EAB.

Archery Deer Hunt – One Antlerless deer was harvested during the January 5th & 6th deer hunt in the well field.

Forestry Division

The Forestry Division continues to move ahead with ash removal. Evidence of the ash borer's presence in the community has significantly increased from its initial discovery in November of 2017. Additionally, Forestry also has been focusing on adhering to pruning cycles to the best extent possible.

The visual encroachment project (trail and EC River corridor) that was requested by the property Owner at 7 S. Dewey, and approved by the Waterways and Parks Commission was executed last month by Tree Saavy. This work was supervised by our City Forester.

Recreation Division

Winter Safety Fest was held at Pinehurst Park on Thursday, January 17 in collaboration with the Eau Claire Fire Department and Winter After Hours.

The 2019 Pool Membership Sale yielded 141 memberships.
