From the City Manager: Here are a few updates from this week...

Welcome New Transit Manager: With the pending retirement of Tom Wagener, we are happy to announce that Tina Deetz has been named the next Transit Manager. Before coming to Eau Claire, Tina worked for a transit system in the Quad Cities. She did a great deal of work with their paratransit operation and made many improvements to that system. Tina is known for creating good relationships with her co-workers and subordinates. Outside of the workday, Tina is passionate about biking and often commutes to work via bike (six miles each way!). She's active in volunteer groups



and is a proud member of CORBA (Chippewa Off Road Bike Association). Tina is married, with three sons and one daughter, and her family lives just south of Eau Claire. Motion to Dismiss Town of Washington lawsuit: Last week, the City Attorney's Office filed a motion to dismiss the lawsuit brought by the Town of Washington challenging a recent annexation. The Motion to Dismiss cited several deficiencies in the Complaint filed by the Town of Washington, including the Town's failure to follow a statutorily required step prior to filing the lawsuit. Additionally, the City's motion pointed out that both Wisconsin appellate courts that examined what property owner signatures are necessary in annexations concluded that publicly owned and non-developable land

(such as the park land in this case) does not count towards signature requirements. The City Attorney's office will continue to provide updates as circumstances warrant. No date has yet been set for a hearing on the City's motion to dismiss. Questions regarding the status of the litigation can be directed to the City Attorney's office.

Comp Plan Amendment Update: Also related to the recent annexation, you may have <u>read</u> that the Plan Commission did not approve the recent proposed revision to the Comprehensive Plan for some of the area that was annexed. A Comp Plan amendment is one of the steps of planning for the development of the new neighborhoods. The Plan Commission seeks more detail prior to a resubmittal of the amendment. The development team is regrouping and intends to resubmit a Comp Plan Amendment in conjunction with a Rezoning and General Development Plan request at a later date, once their plans are more detailed. Scott Allen reports that the primary takeaway from the Plan Commission's vote was to reconsider the location of the medium/high density residential as well as to provide more details. Stay tuned as the plans get refined.

DOR Releases CIP-U: As has been shared in prior Council budget calendars, the DOR released its CPI-U percent last week. This is the inflation factor that get used in the Expenditure Restraint and Levy Limit calculations. The 7.7 percent CPI-U that the DOR announced is very high. The good news is that this results in Eau Claire and other municipalities having a higher allowable increase in budgets and levies as compared to most other years. The bad news, however, is that the number matches inflation, and employees effectively have a decrease in spending power with such high inflation and raises that don't keep up to the cost of living.

Referendum Website: A website with lots of information about the referendum has been updated and is live here: Public Safety Referendum | City of Eau Claire, Wisconsin (eauclairewi.gov). The page includes basic information about the referendum, a fact sheet, an FAQ, upcoming informational meeting dates (also listed below in the Council calendar), interviews that the Chiefs have already done on the 715 Newsmakers podcast, voting information, and an email address and/or website form through which people can submit questions. Thank you to Tess Morgan, Chief Bell, and Chief Rokus for working hard to assemble information for the voters' deliberation on this important community decision.

Land Use Carbon Calculator: At their last meeting, the Plan Commission gave direction to the City to begin piloting the use of this greenhouse gas emission calculator. The tool is specific to Eau Claire and first in the State to seek this information in development review. It will be useful in terms of how much new carbon emissions will be added to the City's 2015 baseline, given that the goal is to be carbon neutral by 2050. Note that updates on our municipal and carbon inventories will be provided in a month or two so that we can better understand if progress is being made on the interim goal of 30 percent reduction by 2030. Projects that trigger the calculation are major site plans and residential subdivisions above four lots. The tool has three scenario planning options to model various ways to mitigate emissions and compare results from the existing property condition. Included is a cheat sheet of common energy usage stats to aid the developer to estimate emissions. Also listed are lots of net

<u>zero energy resources</u>. This pilot data will be useful for next year when the Planning Division undertakes the zoning code overhaul and works to determine how sustainability measure can be better incorporated.

Speed Bumps: Community Services crews recently installed speed bumps to address a safety concern of people using the driveways to Fairfax Baseball as a shortcut through street. They plan to reopen the driveway on Monday after the concrete cures over the weekend.

Health Department: Here are some Health Department Updates...

AODA Prevention Education National Night Out: On August 2nd, the Alliance attended the Eau Claire, Altoona, and Fall Creek National Night Out events. At these events, Alliance staff talked to kids about healthy coping strategies and handed out information to parents. We had a handful of Alliance members assist with tabling as well. Between the three events, we estimate we had nearly 1,000

- Extension Latinx Open House: Extension ECC hosted a Latinx Open House for Latinx community members to share Extension and non-Extension resources. Education around medication safety in English and Spanish along with deactivation bags were distributed to families.
- <u>Latinx Health Fair</u>: Extension ECC partnered with Neighbor to Neighbor and other community partners to host the Latinx Health Fair for the Latinx community. Education around medication safety in English and Spanish along with deactivation bags were distributed to families and community members.

Monkeypox: As of September 16th, 69 cases of monkeypox have been confirmed in Wisconsin. There have been no confirmed cases in Eau Claire County. The growth curve of this outbreak has been declining statewide, as well as nationwide. The ECCCHD Monkeypox Response Team is actively vaccinating, testing, and conducting case follow-up to help stop the spread of monkeypox in our communities. ECCCHD continues to be one of the few Jynneos vaccinators in the Western Region. We have given 41 vaccinations to high-risk individuals who met WI DHS eligibility criteria. Twenty-two of those vaccinations have been given to EC County residents and 12 to non-residents. We have tested one individual in our Reproductive Health Clinic. Though there have been no confirmed cases in EC County, we have been notified of more than 20 individuals with suspect cases who have been tested, and we have follow-up with these individuals. The ECCCHD team continues to work closely with local healthcare partners, community organizations, WI DHS, and CDC to contain this outbreak. Annual Beach Summary: Each summer, ECCCHD performs routine monitoring of seven swimming areas in Eau Claire County. This includes weekly surveillance for bacteria and algae, which is performed with field measurements, laboratory testing, and visual observation. The frequency of monitoring generally increases to daily when elevated bacteria or algae blooms are present. The Department typically begins monitoring prior to Memorial Day weekend and visits each site through Labor Day. The purpose of ECCCHD's beach monitoring program, which is among the most robust inland beach monitoring programs in Wisconsin, is to promote safe use of recreational waters in the county by informing users of any known hazards at these beaches and restricting use whenever there is high potential for illness during recreational use.

It was a very busy summer in this program in 2022, mainly due to persistent algae blooms in the waterbodies along the Eau Claire River. Collectively, the beaches in Eau Claire County were closed for a total of 106 days either due to elevated bacteria levels or the visible presence of a harmful algae bloom. Lake Altoona Beach had the highest number of closure days, with five individual closure events totaling 54 days (Note: eight of those days overlapped with a bacteria closure). Lake Eau Claire had two algae closures totaling 37 days as well as a two-day bacteria closure, totaling 39 days of closure. The longest visible harmful algae bloom occurred at Lake Eau Claire, lasting for 35 days from the beginning of August through Labor Day, when seasonal monitoring was discontinued. The beaches at Big Falls, Half Moon Lake, and Riverview Park were each closed at some point this summer. However, each was closed for five or fewer days. Both beaches at Coon Fork Lake stayed open for the entire beach season, which is the first time this has happened since 2016.

There were also two algae advisories issued in 2022. Advisories are generally posted whenever elevated harmful algae toxin levels are measured in the swimming area, but a harmful algae bloom is not visible on the water's surface. The two algae advisories occurred at Lake Altoona (one day succeeding and algae closure) and Big Falls (six consecutive days).
