
From the City Manager:

Budget Process Wrap-Up: As a reminder, we wrap up the budget this coming week with review and action on the slightly revised budget, which now includes changes attributable to the referendum.

Closed Session: We have just added a closed session for Monday to allow for discussion of the possible purchase of 131 Farwell Street, which is adjacent to City Hall.

Did You Know - Shared Property Room: The Eau Claire Police Department has a shared property room. In 2013, the Eau Claire Police Department (ECPD) and Eau Claire County Sheriff's Office (ECSO) combined our property room into one. The ECSO took on the fingerprinting responsibilities in exchange for the ECPD taking on their property room. Both of the Property and Evidence Technicians are employees of the ECPD. The property room has storage at the Law Enforcement Center and off-site storage for long term and vehicle storage.

On average the property room takes in 6,500 pieces of property and disposes of approximately 4,800 per year. This includes property for both the Eau Claire Police Department and the Eau Claire County Sheriff's Office. Currently, there are approximately 21,500 pieces of property, with about 75% belonging to the ECPD and 25% belonging to ECSO. The ECPD and ECSO share the cost of evidence packaging supplies through a Memorandum of Understanding.



One obstacle the property room has is storage, especially for biological evidence. Per state statute biological evidence must be retained until an offender is no longer on supervision. For example, if an offender was sentenced to 10 years in prison and 10 years of extended supervision, we must keep that piece of biological evidence for 20 years. Just this week we added a new refrigerator and freezer to help store the evidence as our current refrigerator and freezer are full.


Beards for a Cause: Lately you may have noticed officers growing beards; that is not because of untidiness, but it's for a good cause. Annually, the Eau Claire Police Department hosts a No-Shave November fundraiser to help support members of our local community who are being treated for cancer. When a family member or friend is being treated for cancer, even with great health insurance, cancer treatments can quickly get expensive and daily activities become a struggle. This year, to help a family member of the one of our team, we're raisings funds to support the costs related to treatment for Officer Madi Harer's sister K.k., who is currently undergoing treatment for bladder cancer. Meet the Eau Claire Police Department Honor Guard: This distinguished specialty represents the Eau Claire Police Department and the City of Eau Claire at law enforcement, public, and private ceremonial events, including: officer funerals, memorials, ceremonies, graduations, sporting events and parades. Honor Guard members train monthly, practicing precision movements, marching, flag folding, rifle salutes, casket carrying, and funeral preparation. The Honor Guard often works with the Eau Claire Fire Department Honor Guard, Eau Claire County Sheriff's Office Honor Guard, and other teams in the region.

The Honor Guard has made notable appearances at the National Law Enforcement Memorial, The Wisconsin State Capitol, and Milwaukee Brewer and Bucks games, among others. Most recently, the Honor Guard was proud to present colors at the North High School Veterans Day Celebration.



Community Services: Here are some updates from all the divisions....

Streets:

- <u>New Streets Supervisor</u>: Congratulations to Chad Hesselink who has been promoted to Streets Supervisor. He began in his new role this week.
- Winter Weather: Streets crews have been busy with the winter weather we've had. Crews are
 plowing, sanding, and salting as needed to control slippery areas. Fleet staff continue to
 prepare all remaining snow removal equipment, dealing with maintenance issues as they arise,
 and staying on top of the regular preventative maintenance required on each of the over 350
 vehicles and pieces of equipment.

Recreation:

- <u>Parade</u>: The Clearwater Winter Parade has received 59 entries and staff are working to recruit volunteers. If you are interested in helping out, please sign up for a shift here: https://www.signupgenius.com/go/10c0e45aaa822a1fd0-clearwater
- Rinks: With the colder weather, staff are preparing to supervise the outdoor rinks at Boyd, Pinehurst, Roosevelt, and Putnam Heights. The rinks are scheduled to open just after Christmas; weather-dependent, of course. Carson Park Football concessions have wrapped up for the season. Staff will clean, inventory, and winterize the space. Over at Hobbs, Thanksgiving week is traditionally one of the busiest weeks for the facility. School's Out Open Skating, local high school and UWEC practices, and Eau Claire Memorial's Thanksgiving Tournament are all on the agenda. Unlike in previous years, the Turkey Trot will not be based out of Hobbs this year, which allows the facility to be closed on Thanksgiving Day this year.

Parks:

- <u>Green Waste Facility</u>: The Green Waste Facility on Jeffers Road closed for the season on Wednesday, November 16th after another successful season. The site will reopen for the Merry Mulch Christmas Tree Recycling program closer to the Christmas holiday.
- <u>Forestry</u>: Forestry staff have completed the fall planting and have resumed their focus on pruning and scheduled tree removals.
- <u>Winter Operations</u>: Parks staff are shifting to winter operations. Trail clearing, grooming, rink upkeep, and more are regular parts of the winter schedule. Consistent weather below freezing is required before the outdoor skating rinks can be flooded and opened for use.

Utilities:

- <u>Treatment Plants</u>: Operations at the Water Treatment Plant are running smoothly. The north settling basin is being cleaned and Well 13 is awaiting screen repairs and should be back online by early January. The Wastewater Treatment Plant is also operating smoothly. The fall biosolids distribution effort is wrapping up. Sewer Collection crews are continuing their annual effort to cuts roots away from the large-diameter mains.
- <u>PFAS</u>: Discussions are ongoing with the Department of Natural Resources and contractor Gannett Fleming concerning PFAS treatment design parameters and preliminary testing.
- <u>Hydrant Flushing</u>: Distribution staff have completed their fall hydrant flushing operation and are currently working on repairing water valves and hydrants.

Transit:

- Holiday Schedule: Buses will not run on Thursday, November 24th for the Thanksgiving holiday.
 Operations will run normally the rest of the week.
- <u>UWEC Contract</u>: Eau Claire Transit and the University of Wisconsin Eau Claire are finalizing an agreement that would expand service to the University. The Amalgamated Transit Union Local 1310 has submitted a sideletter to their contract that would allow for the expansion of service. Both items will be reviewed by City Council at the November 22nd meeting.

<u>Health Department:</u> The Health Department is offering several vaccine clinics this week. It's a good idea to get your flu vaccine and fall COVID-19 booster before the holiday season. It takes about two weeks after getting a flu or COVID-19 vaccine for your body to build up defenses against infection, so getting up to date on those vaccines now can help protect you from becoming seriously ill with COVID-19 or the flu this winter season. It is safe to receive a COVID-19 vaccine and a flu shot at the same time. Both the flu shot and COVID vaccines are free at our clinics.
