




#### **ECHA Coalition:**

• Partnered with Chippewa & Dunn Counties with the second annual Chippewa Valley Summer Activity Passport Program From June-August, we received 122 photo submissions from community members having fun outside. The passport included a new activity, geocaching. The passport webpage had 880 views and 74 geocache page views. Over 170 people scanned the QR code. The code was on materials that were given at the Northern WI State Fair in Chippewa Falls, National Night Out in Altoona and Menomonie, Sounds like Summer Concert Series in Eau Claire and Menomonie, Y on the Fly Children's Event in Chippewa and more. Six prizes (two prizes per county) were given and included outdoor lawn games, exercise equipment, and more.



Promoted healthy nutrition at outreach events and on social media

Partnered with the Mental Health Action Team to table at the Sounds like Summer Concert series in downtown Eau Claire in August. Hy-Vee donated healthy snacks and recipes which were offered at the event along with other resources provided by the Eau Claire City-County Health Department. The Action Team continued our partnership with UW-Extension to promote Harvest of the Month program in the community and encourage participation in a new event, The Great Lakes Apple Crunch on social media.

Promoted physical activity for older adults
 Tabled at the Mcdonough Park dedication event and provided information about physical activity and the summer activity passport. Prepared to launch a Winter Wellness Bingo Challenge in January 2023 to keep older adults active and well throughout the winter.
