#### Fact Sheet – 1/24/2024 Board of Health Meeting Agenda Item 4.a Quarter 4, 2023 Financial Update

The Quarter 4, 2023 Financial Statements are attached. Year-end adjustments will be made through the beginning of March, and preliminary year-end financial statements will be presented to Board of Health in April. Final year-end financial statements will be brought to Board of Health in the Summer.

#### **Balance Sheet**

- The balance sheet will continue to fluctuate while year-end entries are being made.
- Cash is down from prior quarter, but up from prior year, and is mainly due to when revenue is received vs. when expense are paid.
- Accounts receivables and deferred inflows will vary based on the timing of when invoices are created, and the payments are received.
- Prepayments fluctuate based upon timing of health insurance and life insurance payments.
- Accounts payable will fluctuate based on timing of payments. Payments are remitted weekly on Fridays.
- The Fund Balance Control Accounts is the net of the revenues and expenses as of December 31.
- The Fund Balance amounts will not change until the 2023 audit is complete.

#### **Revenue and Expense Report**

- Non-calendar year grants that started in 2023 and end in 2024 will have the unspent portion of their budget carried over from 2023 to 2024. This is not yet reflected in the revised budget.
- Once carryover budget entries and other year-end entries are made, we will have a better indication of where we will end the year. Entries will continue to be made into March.

#### Revenue

- 2023 revenue received in January and February of 2024 will be moved back to 2023
- Intergovernmental revenue appears to be behind because revenue generally arrives a month or two after it is billed.
- License and permit revenue exceeded our budget mainly due to new retail food and restaurant licenses.
- Charges for services revenue exceeded our budget mainly due to increased water testing.
- Charges for services intergovernmental includes tax levy from the County, Medicaid reimbursements, and other revenue billed to the state and counties. Generally, the revenue arrives a month or two after it is earned.
- The entire 2023 tax levy allocation from the City and County has been received and recorded.
- Miscellaneous revenue includes non-governmental grants. The revenue generally arrives a month after it is earned.

#### Expense

- 25.5 of 26 payrolls budgeted (98%) have been recorded. Half of the first payroll in 2024 was for 2023, and that portion will be recorded to 2023.

- 2023 expenses paid in January and February of 2024 will be recorded to 2023, and some line items may be understated at this point.
- Personnel expenses appear under budget due to non-calendar year grants that started in 2023 and end in 2024. The unspent portion will be carried over into 2024 and reduce the 2023 budget.

#### Wisconsin Well Woman Program Donation and Fund Balance Designated Account

The Wisconsin Well Woman Program (WWWP) is a program that pays for specified screenings, diagnostic tests, and patient education related to breast and cervical cancer for eligible woman. Eligibility standards focus on women aged 40-64 years, who have no or limited health insurance benefits and meet income guidelines (at or below 250% of federal poverty level). Women ages 35-44 years with certain symptoms may also qualify for breast screenings. Since July 1, 2015, the Eau Claire City-County Health Department has been contracted by the State to be a multi-jurisdiction coordinating agency for 8 counties: Eau Claire, Chippewa, Dunn, Jackson, Pepin, Pierce, St. Croix, and Trempealeau with some State funding for this outreach and case management/coordination role (\$69,083).

Throughout the month of October, which is Breast Cancer Awareness Month, the Milwaukee Burger Company located in Hudson invited us to participate in their annual "Burgers For Boobs" program. This partnership has been ongoing for a number of years. Anni Vitriago and Gina Holt were onsite at the restaurant the evening of October 18<sup>th</sup> to greet people and remind them that October is Breast Cancer Awareness month. People were also invited to play a game to win a small WWWP gift and to take a WWWP flyer. Milwaukee Burger Company contributed a percentage of their proceeds during the event to the WWWP Program for the counties that the Health Department serves. The Hudson Milwaukee Burger Company also teamed up with one of their beverage distributors to contribute a donation for each beverage sold in the month of October. The total contributed to the Eau Claire based WWWP was an impressive \$9,100. This money will be divided into three main allocations: Supporting Staffing Expenses (25%), Current and Future Program Service Expenses for Clients (25%,) and Marketing and Outreach Material. (50%). The Current and Future Program Service expenses are to assist with client costs that are not always met by the program – transportation, for example. As client needs may change year to year, and the amount that we receive in donations is not consistent, we intend to open a fund balance account so that unspent dollars may be carried over year to year if needed.

**Budget Implications:** Donation of \$9,100 to be used for WWWP services and outreach will be added to the 2024 budget. 50% of the donated dollars will be spent on outreach activities, 25% will be spent on direct client costs with any unspent 2024 amounts placed into a designated fund balance account for future client needs, and 25% will be used for WWWP staff salary for the additional work related to outreach and client services. Currently, the WWWP grant does not cover the full amount of salary required for staffing costs and this will replace tax levy that is currently supplementing the program.

<u>Staff Recommendations:</u> Accept the \$9100 donation from the Hudson Milwaukee Burger Company AND designate a specific Fund Balance account for donations for WWWP client services.

#### **Vaccines for Adult Grant**

The Eau Claire City County Health Department (ECCCHD) will be awarded a one-time grant from the Wisconsin Immunization Program to be used for Vaccine for Adult (VFA) services. The VFA program no longer allows for billing an administration fee when administering state-supplied vaccine as part of that program. This modification was made due to perceived barriers to persons seeking immunization services at VFA-enrolled sites. This grant plans to help offset the cost of staffing and other activities related to being a VFA provider. VFA providers are able to provide certain vaccines to those without insurance, or to those whose insurance does not cover the cost of vaccines.

In 2023, the ECCCHD administered 332 doses of vaccine to VFA eligible clients. Data from the 2020 United States Census reported that in Eau Claire County, approximately 6% of adults under the age of 65 did not have health insurance. The ECCCHD and the Chippewa Valley Free Clinic are the only VFA providers in Eau Claire County. The ECCCHD not only holds several monthly onsite clinics to provide VFA services to the community but supports periodic clinics at sites like The Community Table, Sojourner House, and the Eau Clarie County Jail. Our immunization program plans to use the grant funding to supplement funds for staffing clinic time, coordination of clinics, and data entry.

The ECCCHD will be awarded \$2000 to support efforts as a VFA provider in Eau Claire County. The grant funds can be used between June 1, 2023, and June 30, 2024. The ECCCHD will utilize these funds for staffing time from time of receipt of one-time grant money (approximately February 1, 2024) through June 30, 2024.

#### **Budget Implications:**

\$2000 to supplement staff time and fringe benefits while supporting VFA provider related activities.

#### Staff Recommendations:

Accept grant funding.

#### State Opioid Response (SOR) Prevention Funding

The ECCCHD in partnership with the Eau Claire Health Alliance Substance Misuse Action Team, has been awarded \$11,485 to support public awareness and community education related to opioid and stimulant drug trends in Eau Claire County and harm reduction education through the State Opioid Response Prevention Project. The funds also will support the purchase of an evidence-based substance use prevention curriculum for Augusta schools.

For this funding mechanism, substance misuse prevention coalitions across the state were eligible to apply for funding to support strategies to reduce the impact of opioids & stimulants. In Eau Claire County misuse of prescription drugs and use of illegal drugs (marijuana, heroin, methamphetamine, and others) has been identified as a top health priority in the 2021 Eau Claire County Community Health Assessment.

The Eau Claire Health Alliance Substance Misuse Action Team and ECCCHD staff will focus this funding on strategies in the Community Health Improvement Plan for Eau Claire County, by sharing information with community members about the risk of addiction associated with opioids and stimulants, the risk of diversion associated with the improper storage and disposal of opioids and stimulants, and the risk of overdose associated with using opioids and stimulants in ways other than prescribed. The funding will also support dissemination of information and education around the use of Naloxone and Fentanyl Test Strips to address opioid misuse and overdose.

In addition, part of this award will fund Botvin LifeSkills curriculum at Augusta Elementary and Augusta Middle Schools. Botvin LifeSkills is currently being taught to all 3rd-8th graders at Augusta, and with this funding they will have materials to continue to teach this evidence-based program next year. Botvin LifeSkills is a research-validated substance abuse prevention program proven to reduce the risks of alcohol, tobacco, drug abuse, and violence by targeting the major social and psychological factors that promote the initiation of substance use and other risky behaviors.

**Budget Implication:** SOR funding in the amount of \$11,485 will support staff time and materials related to opioid, methamphetamine, and harm reduction education efforts in Eau Claire County, such as printed fact sheets and information, social media, and space rental, and support the purchase of Botvin Lifeskills materials to support curriculum implementation in Augusta schools.

**Staff Recommendation:** Approve acceptance of the SOR funding of \$11,485 for opioid and stimulant, harm reduction across Eau Claire County, and curriculum support for Augusta school district.

#### **Eau Claire County Opioid Settlement funding**

The ECCCHD received \$44,170 to support half (.5 FTE) of the cost of a Public Health Specialist following a proposal to the Eau Claire County Opioid Settlement Task Force and subsequent recommendation to and approval by the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors in December 2023.

Through September 2023, funding from grants supported the time of a Public Health Specialist with the Eau Claire City-County Health Department to coordinator distribution of harm reduction (Narcan, fentanyl test strips) and medication safety supplies (lock bags and boxes, medication deactivation kits) and to provide education and awareness related to opioid prevention through workshops and materials to help community members understand the opioid crisis and tools to help address it. Changes were made to grant programs at the Wisconsin Department of Health Services which previously supported this work. The Opioid Settlement funds will allow ECCCHD to continue to implement this program in 2024.

**Budget Implication:** Funding in the amount of \$44,170 will support .5 FTE of a Public Health Specialist to coordinate distribution of harm reduction and medication safety supplies and to provide education and awareness related to opioid prevention through workshops and materials. Additional funding was identified to cover the remainder of this position in 2024. This is one-time funding from the County Opioid Settlement so additional work is planned to determine long term funding strategy.

**Staff Recommendation:** Approve acceptance of the funding of \$44,140 for 50% of the Public Health Specialist position.

#### Local Health Department Public Health Infrastructure Grant

The Wisconsin Division of Public Health (DPH) applied for and received a grant from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) titled: *Strengthening U.S. Public Health Infrastructure, Workforce, and Data Systems grant.* This funding is meant to strengthen the public health system by providing support for core infrastructure improvements in the public health workforce (A1), capacity to implement the Foundational Capabilities (A2), and data infrastructure (A3). The Wisconsin Division of Public Health (DPH) is passing through 40% of A1 funding to local and Tribal health department (LTHD) partners as required. Attached is more information on the total Wisconsin grant award.

DPH's long-term goal is for our statewide governmental public health system to be equipped with the financial and human resources needed to provide all Foundational Capabilities (see The Foundational Public Health Services - Public Health Accreditation Board (phaboard.org)) to every community in Wisconsin. The key expected outcomes of this funding include: (1) the hiring, retention, and training of diverse staff with improved wages and protections, ideally in positions that directly support the Foundational Capabilities; and (2) the increased capacity of public health agencies to implement the Foundational Capabilities. The funding period is December 1, 2022 through November 30, 2027. Contracts were just received by local health departments for local funding. Eau Claire City-County Health Department was allocated a total of \$291,614 for the five year grant period.

ECCCHD intends to utilize these funds to support the identified CDC grant objectives of:

- Retain public health staff
- Train new and existing public health staff
- Support the implementation of Foundational Capability work

This will likely include the funding of existing and potentially new positions focused on foundational capabilities, the funding of training for existing staff, and the development of resources and tools to advance foundational capabilities in our worksite. Funding is targeted to be utilized for the 2025-2027 budget years. This strategy is being undertaken by many local health departments. More details will be available as the workplan is developed.

The Foundational Public Health Services include a specific focus on health equity and are identified as part of the work of our 2023-2025 Strategic Plan.

#### **Budget Implication:**

The intention is to utilize this grant in subsequent budget periods and would be carried forward until 2025 to be utilized for staffing, training, and any necessary contracts.

Staff recommendation: Accept the PH Infrastructure grant of \$291,614

#### **Funding Overview CDC Public Health Infrastructure Grant - Wisconsin**

Wisconsin DPH has thus far been awarded \$53,506,757\* across three strategy areas. The grant performance period runs from 12/1/2022 to 11/30/2027.

- 1. **A1 Workforce \$43,018,968:** Funds support the recruitment, hiring, training, and retention of a well-trained and skilled public health workforce. CDC has provided this funding to DPH in full to cover all five years of the grant period. CDC required that DPH pass through a minimum of 40% of these funds to the local public health system; for Wisconsin, that include 11 federally-recognized Tribal Nations as well as all local health departments.
- A2 Foundational Capabilities These funds are intended to assess and strengthen the capacity
  of the public health system to provide the Foundational Capabilities, as defined by
  the Foundational Public Health Services model. Funds are provided one year at a time and are
  subject to federal funding availability.

Year 1: \$1,929,331Year 2: \$3,376,295

- 1. **A3 Data Modernization –** This includes 3 sub-strategies listed below:
  - Core Data Modernization Funds are provided one year at a time and are subject to federal funding availability.

Year 1: \$648,515

- Year 2: No funds available as of 10/05/2023
- Data Modernization Intiative Acceleration \$4,634,705
- Laboratory Data Exchange (LDX) \$3,275,238

\*This \$53,506,757 is the total of three 5-year allocations and one year of each of the two annual allocations. Funding availability for A2 and A3 Core in years 2 - 5 would increase this overall total.

**Health Department Plans and BOH oversight** 

The ECCCHD Board of Health is the policy body responsible for oversight of the health department. The authority for the BOH is named in state statute, state administrative rule, and local ordinance. Additionally, the national accrediting agency for local health departments, PHAB, describes expectations for the local governing body. The work of the BOH happens primarily during monthly BOH meetings with both business agenda items (policy decisions) and informational agenda items (awareness, feedback, direction). There are many plans and official documents that guide health department efforts. Some of these we have historically brought to the BOH for review and approval, some we have brought just for occasional review and discussion, some we have brought for more regular updates. Over time the department has realized that there would be value in having a guidance document approved by the BOH that delineates their expectations related to which plans/documents they need to review and approve as business items, and which are informational only and delegated for review and approval to the Director/Health officer.

Attached for your consideration is a draft of a cataloguing of these plans/documents and a proposal for the process and action of the BOH for each. The goal would be to have less uncertainty about which documents are shared, when they are shared, and how they are brought to the BOH. The overall intention is for the BOH to be well informed and impacting key policy and practice plans/documents.

**Budget Implications:** Nothing noted.

#### Eau Claire City-County Health Department Report to the Board of Health

#### **Respiratory Update**

Influenza, RSV, and COVID-19 activity are circulating widely. Influenza-like Illness activity is at a high level across Wisconsin and most of the United States. As of 1/8/2023, 80 cases of COVID-19-associated hospitalizations, 16 cases of RSV-associated hospitalizations, and 22 cases of influenza-associated hospitalizations in EC County residents have been reported. ECCCHD continues to encourage community members to get vaccinated. This the first year vaccines are available for all 3 of these illnesses.

#### **County Groundwater Model (Update from Aug 2023)**

As last updated in August, Eau Claire County had applied to the US Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) to consider a county-wide groundwater flow model. However, this application was surprisingly not selected. The USACE received an overwhelming number of applications during this process and elected to prioritize projects from areas with 100% environmental justice communities. While Eau Claire County contains environmental justice-eligible areas, it is not a 100% environmental justice community. Therefore, the county was not awarded assistance for the flow model. The USACE staff have provided other options that would be available to Eau Claire County to continue moving forward with this project. The remaining options would most likely require a greater local financial commitment than the original approach. These options will be considered by the Eau Claire County Groundwater Advisory Committee at their January 2024 meeting.

#### **UWEC Beyond Biology Class Discussion Panel**

On December 7<sup>th</sup>, one of our lab team members participated in a class discussion panel with UWEC's Beyond Biology class. This discussion included 2 other panelists and allowed an opportunity for students to hear about possible careers in science & personal perspectives of various career paths. This was a new collaboration for our team to participate in and was a valuable discussion for upcoming graduates.

#### **PFAS Assistance**

Late in 2023, our laboratory team was made aware of an elevated PFAS/PFOS result within Eau Claire County. The team followed up with nearby homeowners to help educate them on public health guidance, laboratory & testing options, and potential next steps. Our chemist, Anna Hilger, assisted interested homeowners in their process of PFAS sampling through on-site well water collection, shipping facilitation, and coordination with the testing laboratory. These homeowners were grateful for the support they received in this process. The team is prepared to conduct additional consultation with these and other homeowners in the area pending the test results.

#### **American Phoenix Community Noise Update**

As discussed in previous updates, American Phoenix, Inc. (API) took several steps in the past year to reduce the amount of noise extending from their facility into surrounding neighborhoods. Investigations performed in late-summer suggested a significant improvement in nearby neighborhoods. Field measurements and discussions with residents have revealed that these improvements have continued despite the loss of buffering vegetation since late-fall. Public health faculty and students recently finalized a technical report demonstrating the noise reduction that has been achieved at various noise sources. This report also reiterated ECCCHD's earlier findings about the limited areas near Banbury place where noise from API had been significantly contributing to the overall noise measurements in the community.

#### **AODA prevention curriculum for schools**

CHP staff applied for and were awarded a small grant to fund Botvin LifeSkills curriculum materials for Augusta Elementary and Augusta Middle Schools. Botvin LifeSkills is currently being taught to all 3<sup>rd</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> graders at Augusta, and with this funding they will have materials needed to continue to teach this evidence-based program next year. Botvin LifeSkills is a research-validated substance abuse prevention program proven to reduce the risks of alcohol, tobacco, drug abuse, and violence by targeting the major social and psychological factors that promote the initiation of substance use and other risky behaviors.

#### **Youth Vaping prevention project**

As part the state's settlement agreement with Juul Labs, the e-cigarette manufacturer, ECCCHD received funding from March 1, 2023 and December 31, 2023 to support activities that prevent use and address harm caused by e-cigarettes.

With this funding, the ECCCHD Community Health Promotion team 1) completed a retail assessment that looked at advertisements, density, and location of vaping products as well as THC and alcohol products at county retailers, 2) investigated county resources for vape disposal, and 3) created educational resources to prevent youth vaping and to support youth who already vape to quit.

The county wide educational campaign shared quit resources designed for youth, and highlighted effective prevention messages identified with youth input, including mental health and environmental messages. E-cigarette

Workbook, a resource designed to walk teens through the process of quitting. The team designed messages for social media (Snapchat, Instagram, and Facebook), posters and window clings for distribution at youth serving organizations and schools, and bus ads. In addition, SAFE groups at several county schools created vaping prevention and cessation videos which were shared on social media by ECCCHD and participating schools and SAFE chapters.

#### **Safe Spaces Coalition**

Alison Harder from the Community Health Promotion Division and Abby Hinz from Clinical Services worked in partnership with the Chippewa Valley LGBTQ+ Community Center to host a Safe Spaces Coalition meeting. This group hasn't met for a few years due to the pandemic but had a great turnout with a variety of interested community partners attending. Historically, the group has focused on reducing risk factors and enhancing protective factors related to health disparities that LGBTQ+ community members face in the Chippewa Valley. At the meeting on December 13<sup>th</sup>, attendees identified interest in working on updating an existing resource guide, providing education, and creating a group to respond to and celebrate LGBTQ+ focused events. The group plans to meet quarterly to continue this work.

#### Opioid and overdose prevention

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services and Department of Justice completed a statewide tour in December to hear from local community leaders and partners who are working on prevention, harm reduction, treatment, and recovery support services due to the impact of opioids. Attorney General Josh Kaul and



Secretary-designee Kirsten Johnson met with public health officials, law enforcement agencies, recovery treatment organizations, and members of school-based prevention programs. The Eau Claire City-County Health Department was invited to participate in the roundtable discussion to share additional local needs related to opioids and to celebrate successes.



Attorney General Josh Kaul met with the Eau Claire County Sheriff's Office and the health department to learn more about the success of the recently installed vending in the jail lobby. The vending machine was installed in June and programmed to dispense Narcan nasal spray and fentanyl test strip kits. It is available to the community 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Six months after its launch, the vending machine had dispensed 503 boxes of Narcan (total of 1,006 doses) and 250 fentanyl test strip kits (total of 1,250 test strips).



Attached is the 2023-2025 Strategic Plan Dashboard with detail on progress on activities. The 2023-2025 Strategic Plan was adopted by the Board at the December 2022 meeting. The adopted plan included two large goals with four strategies under each. As a reminder this plan is a 3-year strategic plan, which is a change from our previous 5-year plan. With a shorter timeframe for the plan we have fewer activities. In our current plan we have 26 activities compared to the previous plan with 120 activities. This shift was an intentional prioritization of activities that could be accomplished in the three-year timeframe.

At the end of the 2023 (quarter 4), 65% the activities are in progress. This is the same percent of activies that were in progress at the end of quarter 3 in 2023, however at the end of the fourth quarter 4% of activities have been completed. The end of 2023 was the earliest expected completion date. Many activities are have not been started as some of the activities build off of each other.

#### **Chronic Disease Prevention Action Team -**

- The Chronic Disease Prevention Action Team has a new Co-Chair, Lisa Wells from the Eau Claire County Aging and Disability Resource Center. She's been involved with the action team for several years. We're excited to have her in the Co-Chair role!
- The action team will serve in an advisory role for two recent grants that the Health Department received, as the grant goals align well with the goals of the team.
  - i. One grant is a year-long grant that will focus on the farmers market at the Eau Claire County Government Center. The goal of the grant is to promote the farmers market to three audiences: WIC participants, low-income seniors who participate in senior farmers nutrition program and individuals who live in the Eau Claire neighborhood around the area. CDPAT will assist with educational materials and promotion of the market.
  - ii. The other grant is a one-year assessment grant from the Advancing a Healthier Wisconsin Endowment. The goal of the grant is to do a comprehensive nutrition security assessment in the City of Augusta. The action team will serve as an advisory group as the grant moves through steps of assessment, analyzing results and providing recommendations, best practices and direction for next steps.
- The action team continues to promote the evidence-based class, StrongBodies, for community members
  through our social media and partnerships. UW Extension offers a free virtual class, and ADRC offers a free inperson course.
- Action team promoted the "Reindeer Roundup" scavenger hunt promoted through Eau Claire Parks, Recreation and Forestry department. The goal was to get community members out and exploring the trails. Reindeer signs were hidden in 11 different sites throughout our parks.

#### **Substance Misuse-**

- Prescription Drug Take-Back Event Results: At the October 2023 Drug Take-Back event, Wisconsin led the nation for the fifth time in a row with the most medications collected for safe disposal at 53,122 pounds collected. Eau Claire County contributed over 900 pounds of medication from Take Back Day events and permanent disposal locations. Thank you to those who participated or volunteered!

- The two Substance Misuse Action Team workgroups continue to meet regularly. The alcohol misuse workgroup is putting final touches on a resource guide for accessing treatment resources in Eau Claire County. The drug misuse workgroup has been doing research around knowledge and impacts of methamphetamine to help inform an educational campaign. Both workgroups will meet monthly in 2024 to continue work on CHIP goals and objectives. The Substance Misuse Action Team, which brings together the two workgroups as well as other community partners, will meet every other month in 2024. SMAT meetings will include trainings about substance misuse, partnership opportunities, and more.

#### Mental Health -

- The Mental Health Action Team has a new Co-Chair, Christina Lium from the Wisconsin Child Psychiatry Consultation Program. She's been involved with the action team for several years. We're excited to have her in the Co-Chair role!
- In partnership with the Substance Misuse Action Team, our team is distributing bar coasters in rural communities (~1500) with a mental health message and resource. The opposite side of the coaster has information about drinking responsibly and resources.
- Partnering with Eau Claire County SAFE students to create a social connection challenge, where students will complete a set of actions that encourage social connection in their school and communities. SAFE students who complete the challenge will be entered to win a gift card from Tactical Escape 101.
- The action team continues to work with Chippewa and Dunn counties on suicide prevention strategies.

# Healthy Relationship Promotion-

- This action team has been working to update their Healthy Relationship Toolkit which is full of resources to help adults and youth with topics related to healthy relationships. Will be able to filter by resource type and topic.
- The team is also continuing healthy relationship programming- Safe Dates and HIP teens, and 3R's (all evidence-based programming).
- They are in the progress of printing and distributing 'Connect with Me conversation starter cards". These cards are adapted with permission from versions from the Wisconsin Department of Health Services and Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services. The purpose of the cards is to help start conversations with youth (middle school age and older) about a variety of topics, including building connections, taking action, technology, relationships, development, body image, mental health, substances, growing up, tough stuff and nutrition/physical activity. By having regular conversations with youth, you can help build trust, let youth feel safe to ask questions, and later come back if they need help. Having a trusted adult helps youth build resilience.
